Biographies

Professor Mary Donnelly



Professor Mary Donnelly is a Professor and Vice Dean of the School of Law at University College Cork. She researches in the fields of mental capacity/mental health/health law. Her books include Healthcare Decision-Making and the Law: Autonomy, Capacity and the Limits of Liberalism (Cambridge: Cambridge University Press, 2010) and she is co-author of End-of-Life Care: Ethics and Law (Cork University Press, 2011) and co-editor of Ethical and Legal Debates in Irish Healthcare: Confronting Complexities (Manchester University Press, 2016). She was a member of the Expert Group to review the Mental Health Act 2001 (2013-2015) and is a member of the Mental Health Commission Legislation Committee. She was Chair of the Technical Expert Group to develop Codes of Practice under the Assisted Decision-Making (Capacity) Act 2015. She is Chair of the HSE Assisted Decision Making Steering Group and Chair of the Advance Healthcare Directives Multidisciplinary Working Group. She is the joint chair of the HSE National Consent Advisory Group.

Ms. Áine Flynn



Ms. Áine Flynn graduated from Trinity College Dublin with a law degree and M.Litt. by research. She was admitted as a solicitor in 1999 and from 2012-2017 was a senior partner in KOD Lyons, a firm specialising in public interest law, including disability and equality law. She was on the panel of legal representatives of the Mental Health Commission and the Mental Health (Criminal Law) Review Board from their inception in 2006 and also represented Wards of Court instructed by the General Solicitor. She has written and lectured on Human Rights and has been a member of the Human Rights Committee of the Law Society since 2012. Prior to her present appointment, she was a member of the Law Society's Mental Health and Decision-Making Capacity Task Force. In October 2017, Áine commenced in post as inaugural Director of the Decision Support Service within the Mental Health Commission.

Professor Brendan Kelly



Professor Brendan Kelly is Professor of Psychiatry at Trinity College Dublin, Consultant Psychiatrist at Tallaght University Hospital, Dublin, and UCD Visiting Full Clinical Professor at University College Dublin School of Medicine and Medical Sciences. In addition to his medical degree (MB BCh BAO), he holds masters degrees in epidemiology (MSc), healthcare management (MA) and Buddhist studies (MA); and doctorates in medicine (MD), history (PhD), governance (DGov) and law (PhD). He has authored and co-authored over 250 publications in peer-reviewed journals, over 500 non-peer-reviewed publications, 13 book chapters and contributions, and 11 books (eight as sole author). His recent books include 'Hearing Voices: The History of Psychiatry in Ireland' (2016), 'Mental Illness, Human Rights and the Law' (2016) and 'The Doctor Who Sat For A Year' (2019). He is a Fellow of the Royal College of Psychiatrists, the Royal College of Physicians of Ireland, and Trinity College Dublin. In 2017, he became Editor-in-Chief of the *International Journal of Law and Psychiatry*.

Mr. Alex Ruck Keene



Mr. Alex Ruck Keene is an experienced English barrister, writer and educator. His practice (at 39 Essex Chambers in London) is focused on mental capacity law (broadly defined). He has appeared in cases involving the Mental Capacity Act 2005 at all levels up to and including the United Kingdom Supreme Court and the European Court of Human Rights. He also writes extensively in the field, editing and contributing to leading textbooks and (amongst many other publications) the 39 Essex Chambers Mental Capacity Law Report, the 'bible' for solicitors (and others) working in the area.

Alex is the creator of the website www.mentalcapacitylawandpolicy.org.uk, providing resources and expert commentary on some of the most difficult mental capacity issues. Alex is a Visiting Senior Lecturer at the Institute of Psychiatry, Psychology and Neuroscience at King's College London, a Visiting Lecturer at the College's Dickson Poon School of Law, and a Wellcome Trust Research Fellow there, working on the collaborative Mental Health and Justice project for the period 2017-2022. He spent from November 2016 to March 2017 on secondment to the Law Commission of England & Wales as a consultant to their Mental Capacity and Deprivation of Liberty Project, and 2018 as legal adviser to the Independent Review of the Mental Health Act 1983 in England & Wales.

Alex has a particular interest in comparative mental capacity law, co-editing The International Protection of Adults (OLIB, 2015), contributing to a forthcoming textbook on
