















Summary of Experience from the 2017 International Health & Development Training for Healthcare Workers

Friday 13th – Sunday 15th October 2017 <u>Achill Outdoo</u>r Education Centre, Achill Island, Co Mayo

From Friday 13th through Sunday 15th Oct 2017, 55 participants and 9 facilitators braved the incoming Storm Ophelia to attend the International Health and Development Training weekend at the Achill Outdoor Education Centre in Achill Island, Co Mayo. The workshop was organised by the Health Service Executive (HSE) Global Health Programme in partnership with Comhlámh; the Irish Forum for Global Health; Kimmage Development Studies Centre; University College Dublin; National University of Ireland, Galway; and ESTHER Ireland, with support from Irish Aid.





The workshop covered a range of topics for healthcare workers who were interested in volunteering in less-developed countries. It introduced key issues in global health and the nature of healthcare in resource-poor settings, and provided attendees with opportunities to explore skills and competencies they could bring to the sector.

Participants engaged in practical workshops and training activities including: role play, diversity board games, case studies, a living sculpture exercise, group work, candid discussions exploring peoples' cultures and beliefs, a live video link to a healthcare worker in Mozambique, and even the design of a latrine in a refugee crisis situation! Those who had worked or volunteered in less-developed countries shared their fascinating experiences with the group as well.

Feedback on the Weekend

At the close of the weekend, we asked participants to complete an evaluation of their experience so that we could gather feedback on the content and structure of this unique training weekend.

What people enjoyed the most about the course was the fact that it brought together a like-minded but diverse group of people, with opportunities for networking and sharing experiences. Participants noted the warm atmosphere, excellent facilitators, and positive group dynamics. Overall, the majority of participants said that it was a "great weekend. Well done and thank you".

"I found it a fantastic weekend, mainly because of all the people involved – participants, presenters, and staff of the outdoor centre."

"It was most positive and reflective. It challenged my views and past experiences, and enlightened my enthusiasm to partnership in future. Well done." The course organisers noted a few areas for potential improvement to shape future training courses like this. Attendees suggested it would be great to include more downtime time to explore Achill Island, as many had never been there before. Recommended topics for future courses included: additional presentations on specific options and opportunities for volunteering and working overseas; ethics and code of practice; mental health and self-care when volunteering; up-to-date information on current humanitarian emergencies; and presentations from people who have recently returned from volunteering or working abroad.
