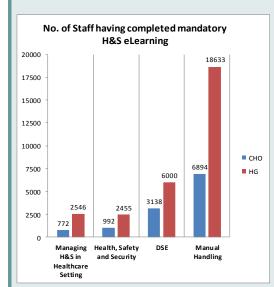

WHAT DO THESE CHANGES MEAN TO ME?

The official retirement age is increasing therefore many workers are likely to face both longer working lives and longer exposure to hazards at work as well as a changing world of work. The changes we are facing in Ireland result in various challenges for Employees, Managers, Employers and Organisations:

- Longer working lives may result in longer exposures to risk
- Older workers might be more vulnerable to certain hazards
- Injury prevention, rehabilitation and return to work are of increased importance

To prevent higher incidents of ill—health, efforts have to be made to ensure safe and healthy working conditions throughout the whole working life.

HEALTH & SAFETY AUTHORITY (HSA), SUMMARY OF WORKPLACE INJURY, ILL HEALTH & FATALITIES STATISTICS 2015 - 2016

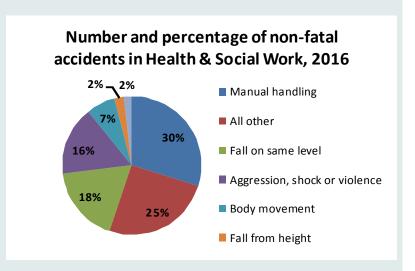
The HSA has recently published statistics from which this is a very brief summary relating to the healthcare sector.

8,381 non-fatal injuries were reported to the HSA in 2016. The largest number of non-fatal injury reports to the HSA came from the Health and Social Work sector. This sector submitted 19.3% (n=1536) of the non-fatal injury reports relating to staff.

Manual handling-related injuries continue to account for about one-third of all non-fatal injuries reported to the HSA (33%), with 30% reported for workers in the Health and Social Work sector.

The Health and Social Work sector reported 16% of the incidents involving aggression, fright, shock or violence.

Health and Social Work sector had the **highest illness rates** in 2015 (4+ days lost) with 41 per 1,000 workers, compared to the 2nd highest sector, Accommodation and Food Services, with 33 per 1,000.



Since 2011, women have experienced a higher illness rate than men. Older workers continue to have higher work-related illness rates than younger workers. See www.hsa.ie for full report.

NHS trust fined £1m following 53 year old man's death

The patient died on 10 April 2012 from internal injuries after falling onto an exposed metal post on the standing aid hoist that staff were using to support him.

The kneepad on the standing aid hoist had been incorrectly removed leaving the exposed metal post that

caused the fatal injuries when he collapsed after standing up.

A Health and Safety Executive (HSE) investigation found the Trust did not have systems for training and monitoring how staff used the standing aid hoist and unsafe practices had developed.

The Trust was found guilty and was fined £1 million and ordered to repay

£160,000 in costs.

The trust has also been ordered to pay £3,800 to the patients family to cover the costs of the funeral.

After the hearing the Trust stated that "If staff had received effective training and monitoring in the use of the standing aid hoist the death could have been avoided."

Flu Every year the flu vaccine is offered to health care workers to prevent the spread of flu to vulnerable patients and to staff. **Health care workers should get the**

flu vaccine to protect themselves, their families and their patients. This year the HSE aims to achieve a target of 40% flu vaccine uptake among health care workers.



Facts about flu

- ✓ Healthcare workers are 10 times more likely to get flu
- ✓ Flu vaccine is the best protection against flu for at risk groups and healthcare workers
- \checkmark Flu causes death and hospitalisation every year

4 OUT OF 5 IRISH DRIVERS ADMIT TO USING ELECTRONIC DEVICES WHILE DRIVING.

IS THIS YOU?

Research carried out by IPSOS Mori on behalf of Aviva suggests four out of five Irish drivers admit to using electronic devices or consulting maps through a device while driving.

The key findings of the survey are:

- $60\%\,$ Eat and drink at the wheel
- 45% Making a phone call while driving without handsfree kit
- 26% Sending text messages while driving
- 15% Checking/posting to social media while driving
- 11% Viewing or uploading images to social media while driving.

Speaking about the findings, Michael Bannon,
Underwriting Manager with Aviva Motor Insurance, said:
"It is shocking to find that so many drivers are taking such risks, given all that we know about road safety. Just a split second of distraction or lapse in concentration can result in death on the road."
